He was extremely conscientious in his work, and very thoughtful of his friends and his family. He has been assistant secretary of the Conrad Memorial Ceme-

tery Association since the death of A. N. Tobie 10 years ago. Besides his wife he is survived by his son, Harold and a little granddaughter of Seattle, his mother and a sister, Mrs. Hoffman, both of Libby; a brother Dell Tate of St. Paul, and two sisters, Mrs. Bess Davis of Broadhead, Wis., and Mrs. Ora G. Jones of Redwing, Minn.
