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WHITEFISH MAN IS KILLED WHEN HIT BY AUTOMOBILE

Frank Kaldal was instantly killed about 1 o'clock this morning when he was struck by a car driven by Allen Quien of Whitefish.

The accident occurred on the bridge over the Whitefish river at the southern city limits. Quien and Lyman Hatch and Miss Florence Papineau, who were with him, state that they did not see Kaldal until he stepped in front of the car, and that it was impossible to stop in time to avert the accident. Quien went a few feet past the body before he was able to stop, and in the meantime a taxi driven by Joe Van Hook of Whitefish, going in the opposite direction, struck the body and dragged it several feet, badly mauling it. Van Hook also stated he did not see the body until just as he struck it.

Coroner Campbell is of the opinion that death was instantaneous. Quien was driving north, and Kaldal was in the roadway, although there is a walk for pedestrians at one side.

An inquest will be held Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the City Hall at Whitefish.

Kaldal was 62 years of age, and had recently been operating a shingle mill in Whitefish. It is said that he has relatives in California, and the body will probably be sent there for burial.

DRIVER ABSOLVED IN FATAL MISHAP

At the coroner's inquest into the death of Frank Kaldal, who was killed when struck by an automobile at Whitefish Saturday morning, the jury returned a verdict that the cause of death was a crushed skull and chest and other injuries from being struck by a car driven by Allen Quien, but after hearing all evidence found that the deceased came to his death through an unavoidable accident, and not through criminal negligence on the part of anyone.

The inquest was held in the city hall at Whitefish and Miss Florence Papineau and Lynn Hatch, who were riding with Quien, corroborated his testimony that they did not see Kaldal until it was too late to avoid striking him. It was brought out that the deceased was wearing dark colored clothing, which made it difficult to see him against the black pavement. Quien was driving from 30 to 35 miles per hour he and other witnesses testified.

After the accident Quien drove somewhat past before returning, and the body was struck by a taxi cab driven by Joe Vanhook. Vanhook testified that he did not see the body until he was almost upon it, and thought it was a dog. He turned sharply to avoid it, but the body was caught by a rear wheel and dragged several feet before he could stop.

Several witnesses testified that Kaldal had been drinking heavily for several days, and was in a staggering condition. He was last seen about 11:30 Friday night.

The body will be shipped tomorrow to San Borendo, Calif. for burial.

FRED J. KELLEY IS LEGALLY DECLARED DEAD BY JURIST

Fred J. Kelley, formerly of Butte, was legally declared dead by Judge J. E. Rockwood in district court this morning and his widow, Maybelle Kelley, was appointed administratrix of his estate, consisting of a \$500 insurance policy.

Kelley disappeared from his home in Butte on the morning of May 22, 1929 and has not since been heard from. Investigation by police officers revealed that he had not appeared at his place of employment and that no one had seen him since.

Inquiries at previous places where the family had lived, including his old home in Illinois, brought no information as to his whereabouts.
