GEORGE A. CALBICK

George A. Calbick was born at Unios, Ontario, Canada July 16, 1857 and passed away December 28, 1936 at his home at Swan River from the effects of a stroke, which he had suffered three weeks earlier.

Mr. Calbick was the sixth son of William and Mary Clabick and was the last surviving member of eight children. Leaving home at the age of 17 he worked in Estes Park, Colo., until 1884 when he went to the Black Hills in South Dakota, where he was foreman for the BXB cattle company for eight years. After engag-

ing in cattle raising until 1907, he came to the Flathead and settled on a farm at Creston where he resided until his advanced age forced him to retire to his quiet home on Swan River.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, Alma A. Calbick; a son, William C. Calbick and family of Creston; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur J. Halvorson of Swan River; three granddaughters and many friends and neighbors.

Mr. Calbick was a constructive worker for his community and was ever ready to lend a helping hand to his friends and neighbors.
