

MRS. JOSEPHINE E. ELLIOT

The high esteem in which Mrs. W. G. Elliot was held in the community was evidenced by the large throng which gathered yesterday to pay a last tribute to her memory. The funeral was held at the home, which was filled to capacity, and many were obliged to remain outside during the service.

Comforting words were spoken by Rev. H. C. Stark of the Presbyterian church, of which Mrs. Elliot had long been a member. Two songs, "Is That Enough?" and "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth," were sung by Mrs. J. A. Gudgel, accompanied by Mrs. H. E. Robbin, and the rooms were resplendent with great masses of beautiful flowers.

Mrs. Elliot's death was a great shock, not only to her family but to her many friends, as it was not known that her condition was critical when she left here October 12 for treatment at the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn. En route, she was joined by her sister, Mrs. Lucinda Olson at Wilmar, Minn., who was with her when the end came without warning on October 15, 24 hours after their arrival there. They had just finished dinner and were planning to attend the theater when she was suddenly stricken, and passed away within a few minutes.

She was born at Norway Lake, Minn. and first came to Kalispell in 1906, when she was employed by the firm of Drew and McDonald. She was married to Mr. Elliot in 1908, and for a short time they made their home in Columbia Falls. They later moved to St. Paul where they remained for a year, but returned in 1911 to Kalispell where the family have since made their home.

Beside her husband she is survived by her daughter, Miss Helen Elliot of Missoula, her son, Howard, of Billings, four brothers and her sister, all of whom reside in Minnesota, with the exception of one brother who is in Canada.

The pall bearers were Dr. W. M. ~~Bottorff~~, Bert Saling, senior, J. H. Chester, H. E. Hobbin, E. S. Dickey and A. J. Braunberger. Interment was in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Lars Embretson was born at St. Olaf, Iowa, May 16, 1856 and lived in Iowa until he was 17 years of age. He then moved to San Francisco, where he remained about three years before coming to Montana in 1876. He at first lived at Diamond City and Helena and then moved into the Sweet Grass hills, where he engaged in cattle ranching. He continued in the cattle business there for 25 years and then retired in 1912 and moved to Kalispell where he had since made his home just outside the city on the old Whitefish road. He passed away Sept. 16, 1937 at his home at the age of 81 years.

Mr. Embretson is survived by one brother, Louis Embretson, of Farmersburg, Iowa, and one sister, Mrs. Johanna Larson of Fosston, Minnesota, and several nieces and nephews. A niece, Mrs. George Munn, of Pendleton, Oregon, was here at the time of his passing.
