

ADOLPH R. ZIMMERMAN

Funeral services for Adolph R. Zimmerman were held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Waggener & Campbell chapel by Rev. Harold C. Stark of the Presbyterian church. The front of the chapel was filled with many beautiful flowers and many friends attended the services. During the chapel service, B. L. Deaman sang a solo and with Mrs. Earl Fuller, Mrs. A. B. Yuill and A. Donsire, sang two hymn selections, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. W. E. Beaman. Friends acting as pall-bearers were C. D. O'Neil, J. W. Swanson, James Lake, W. A. Smith, J. E. Rockwood and T. W. Lavita. Interment was made in the Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Obituary

A. R. Zimmerman was born at Bern, Switzerland, August 13, 1863, and died at Kalispell, Montana, after a lingering illness, on April 13, 1937.

When six years old, he became an orphan and, at the age of 17, with some friends he journeyed across the Atlantic and arrived at Cresco, Iowa. From there he journeyed west on some of the early trains of the Northern Pacific railway, and, after spending some years at Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, he went to North Dakota where, as a laborer, he assisted in the construction of the Great Northern railway then being projected across that state. In the spring of 1888, he settled on a farm near Cresco, Iowa, and remained there until March, 1895, when he came to Kalispell and settled upon the 80-acre timber tract which he cleared, cultivated and occupied until his death.

In the fall of 1888, his widowed sister, Mrs. Andrew Walchli, then of Bern, Switzerland, at his solicitation, journeyed to America with her seven young children and joined him on his farm near Cresco, Iowa. In July, 1893, his sister died, and upon establishing his new home near Kalispell in 1895, he brought her children with him and, with the faithful assistance of his niece, Caroline Walchli, continued to care for them and reared them to maturity. Of these, three have passed on before him, namely, Ernest Walchli, Otto Walchli and Robert Walchli, and the following survive him: Caroline Walchli, Hans Walchli and Paul Walchli, all residing at Kalispell, and Fred E. Wachli, of American Falls, Idaho. Mrs. Myrtle Albin of Kalispell, an adopted niece, also survives him.

For a great many years he was road supervisor of the road district surrounding Kalispell, and in that capacity, was instrumental in improving many of the highways in the district. He was plain and simple in his habits, always dependable, and belonged to the school of rugged honesty. He was a Past Noble Grand of the Odd Fellows' lodge of Kalispell, and leaves a host of warm friends to mourn his loss.

He was married in South Dakota to Miss Minnie Herchert and they later moved to Culbertson, Montana and engaged in farming. In 1919 they came to Somers, where he was employed by the Somers Lumber company until about a year and a half ago, when the family came to Kalispell. Mr. Zucker passed away April 29, 1937.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Minnie Zucker and a brother and a sister in Washington and his seven children, Mrs. Beambigser, of Rocky Mountain House, Alberta, Canada; Mrs. Fred Ruff of Somers; Herman, Fred, Henry, Carl and Mrs. C. W. Riehl all of Kalispell.

Mr. Zucker was a member of the Order of Owls.
