

A letter from Mrs. H. E. Clowes, National City, Calif., gives the following information regarding the death of Mrs. Nellie B. Fessenden, at San Diego, October 12:

The Kalispell friends of George A. Fessenden, Flathead county surveyor till 1937, will be grieved to learn of the death of his wife, Mrs. Nellie Burt Fessenden, in San Diego, California, Wednesday, October 12, after several months of illness. About three weeks ago it was found necessary to enter a San Diego hospital, where, after careful observation, an operation was performed October 12, from which she did not recover.

She made a brave fight to survive her dear companion of over 52 years, whose illness was the cause of their coming to San Diego in September, 1937.

She leaves her husband and a nephew, Laurence Fessenden, who has been as a son to them, his father, Arthur Fessenden, and two brothers, Everett and Robert Fessenden, all of whom attended the funeral services at the Dawson Funeral parlors in National City, Calif., at 3 o'clock, October 17, with

burial at Glen Abbey Memorial cemetery.

The Rev. Canon Rankin C. Barnes, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, San Diego, conducted the last rites and was of great comfort to Mrs. Fessenden during her stay at the hospital and to Mr. Fessenden and Laurence in their sorrow.

The services, with the beautiful flowers from new friends made during their short residence in San Diego, and those from Adah Chapter, O. E. S., Business and Professional Women's club, Flathead Court House employees and old friends of other counties and states, added much to the beauty of the services and comfort to the bereaved ones.

Mr. Ford passed away at his home on west Third street in Whitefish January 25, 1938.

Alexander Allin Fox was born in Lewiston, Mont., December 1, 1886, the son of Amelia and Harvey A. Fox. His mother was a daughter of Hugh Monroe, or "Rising Wolf." His father was an enlisted soldier in the 7th U. S. Cavalry under General George A. Custer, and was a participant in the battle on the Little Big Horn when General Custer and nearly all his command were killed. The elder Mr. Fox was then under command of Major Reno.

After he was mustered out of the service, he went to Lewistown where he married Amelia Monroe, daughter of the first white man to set foot on what is now Montana soil. And it was here in these ranch surroundings that Alex Fox was born.

The early part of his life, Alex Fox spent on the Blackfoot reservation. He attended the Indian schools and lived there for many years while engaged in ranching. The Indian name of "Yellow Bird" was given to him. About 1920 he came to the Flathead and was employed in the North Fork country. In 1925 he was married to Nellie LeFebvre of this city.

They left after their marriage for Glacier park where Mr. Fox engaged in ranching and guiding until his health began to fail him in 1930.

They came to Kalispell in the year, 1930, and have made their home at 448 Fifth Avenue West since that time.

He passed away at his home in Kalispell September 26, 1938, at the age of 53 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Nellie Fox, and two daughters by a former marriage, Mable Dorr, and Stella Lehfeldt, and his stepson, Marsden Eddy.
