Frederick E. Wildey was born near Wyoming, Iowa, April 13, 1862. At the age of 20 years he went to southern Nebraska where he lived 20 years. He was married to Emily I. Dinkle at Mankato, Kansas, Sept. 25, 1895 and came to Kalispell in 1905, locating at Demeroville then the head of navigation for boats plying Flathead Lake and Flathead river.
