TWO DROWNED WHEN AUTO PLUNGES INTO THE KOOTENAI RIVER

Troy, May 6.—George Makin and Courtland Runyan of Yank were drowned in the Kootenai river when their car plunged off the highway over a 12-foot embankment into 10 feet of turbulent muddy water Thursday.

Mrs. Bud Garrison, passenger with them, was able to extricate herself as the auto settled on the bottom of the stream. Forcing herself through a window, she rose to the surface, swam to shore in the ice-cold water, and spread the alarm. Her ability as an expert swimmer saved her life. The three had been in Troy doing some shopping and were on their way home.

Three hours after the accident, which occurred on the outskirts of Troy, Sheriff Frank Boney, with a crew of men using a boat fastened a cable around the sunken car, 20 feet from shore, and brought it to the surface. The waters had washed the bodies out and away.

Investigation disclosed that the steering gear had become uncoupled causing the accident.

Identify Body of Man at Whitefish

A report from Whitefish this afternoon stated that the body of the man found in the Great Northern yards there early yesterday morning has been identified as that of James Ryan, formerly of Deer Lodge and a Canadian World War veteran. Identification was made by a man named Rogers, with whom Ryan had been living in a shack west of the city.

It is understood that Ryan had been drinking heavily and it is believed he had started for his shack by way of the railroad yards and was struck by the train.

Ryan came to Whitefish about seven months ago from Deer Lodge. Rogers was first seen in the vicinity of Whitefish about the same time, coming there from Bozeman.
