Obituary

Frank Feenan was born in Ontario, Canada, July 2, 1873, and lived there until 19 years of age. In 1892 he came to the Flathead for a short time before going to Anaconda, where he worked for 19 years. In 1907 he was married there to Miss Nora Glynn. In 1910 they moved to the Flathead and settled on a farm west of Columbia Falls. Mr. Feenan passed away at the farm home December 22, 1939, at the age of 66 years.

Mr. Feenan is survived by his widow, Mrs. Nora Feenan, at home, a daughter, Mrs. John R. Cavanaugh of Whitefish, and four sons, Fred, Thomas and Robert at home and John of Venice, Calif. There are also three sisters, Mrs. Fred Granger of Anaconda, Mrs. Alice Murphy and Margaret Conley and two brothers, John and Michael Feenan of Ontario, Canada.

JAMES FINE

Obituary

James Fine was born in Canron, Cornwall, England, Nov. 22, 1860, and at the age of 21 years came to the United States. He was a miner and prospector in Michigan, California, Nevada and Montana. In 1888 he came to the Flathead and bought a ranch in the Lower Valley and three years later returned here to make his home. He did a great deal of traveling and had visited many parts of the world. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Order of Eastern Star and Royal Arch Masons. He was confirmed in the Episcopal church at an early age.

Mr. Fine passed away Feb. 8, 1939, at his ranch home in the Lower Valley at the age of 78 years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Susan Fine; one daughter, Mrs. Bessie Grosz of Missoula, and two sons, William E. Fine of Somers and Percy Fine of the Lower Valley. There are also three grandchildren.

ROBERT. W. FLEMING

Robert W. (Bob) Fleming, widely known Polson resident for many years, passed away at Fort Harrison Veterans' hospital at Helena May 20 1939, was buried in Polson Tuesday.

Fleming, who was 59 years of age at the time of his death, homesteaded a few miles southeast of Polson in 1909 and for a time was engaged in freighting from the railroad at Ravalli to Polson.

Fleming was perhaps best known for his part in the man hunt which resulted in the death of Chester Powell, who in 1924 terrorized the countryside in this vicinity after murdering his wife. In the battle in the school section east of Turtle Lake Fleming was wounded in the arm, which subsequently was amputated.

Shortly after the Powell affair, Fleming moved to Kalispell, where he was made foreman of a county road crew in Flathead county—of which the present Lake county was a part. Later he was made supervisor of roads in Glacier park, which position he held at the time of his death.

Mr. Fleming saw service in the Spanish-American war, and was past master of the Polson Masonic lodge.

Funeral services were held at the Masonic temple and at the graveside, and a group of ex-service men rendered military honors at the cemetery. Burial was made in Lakeview cemetery. Rev. Cookson of the Episcopal church at Kalispell officiated.

Survivors are: his wife, two sons and a daughter, and one grandchild.

Isaac L. Flinchpaugh was born July 31, 1858, in Hamilton county, Ohio, one of eight sons born to Caleb and Rachel Flinchpaugh. He received his schooling in a little district school in Hamilton county.

At the age of 30 he went to Kansas where he worked as a bridge carpenter for eight years until he came to Missouri to be employed by the Northern Pacific railway. In 1887 he came to the Flathead, being one week on the road between Missoula and the site which is now Woodland park in Kalispell. He arrived here on Dec. 5 after camping out in the snow en route.

For 40 years he was engaged in ranching, retiring in 1926. During his many years' residence here he witnessed the growth of the community and the coming of modern transportation facilities and many were the tales of early days that he told.

He was married Nov. 13, 1888, to Mary M. Glockle in Missoula. Mrs. Flinchpaugh passed away April 3, 1924. He attended Central Christian church in Kalispell and was much interested in church work. He passed away Nov. 26, 1939, at the age of 81 years.

He is survived by five brothers: William H., Jacob S., Francis M., and Anderson E., all of Cincinnati, Ohio; and David of Ottawa, Kansas; also several nephews and nieces here and in the east.
