Dr. Clarence Earl Hamil was born on January 6, 1873, at Wautoma, Wisconsin, the second youngest of nine children of Peter and Caroline Hamil. After completing his education in the public schools, he entered the University of Wisconsin, finishing his college course at the University of Chicago. He taught school for a couple of years, and then entered the Dental College of Chicago, where he received his degree and thereupon practiced the profession of dentistry for five years. Deciding to go further, he entered the Physicians and Surgeons' College of Illinois, receiving his medical degree in 1906. He first located at Duluth, Minnesota, later moving to Minneapolis, where he practiced until coming west and locating at Kalspell 1 1/2 years ago.

In 1922 he went to Europe where he took post-graduate work, specializing in eye, ear, nose and throat ailments at the Medical Clinic of Vienna.

After several years of strenuous work in Minneapolis, his health broke and he was forced to seek a different climate, coming to Kalspell, where he practiced his profession until a year ago, when his health failed and he was forced to retire.

He was a member of the Masonic order in Minneapolis, later transferring his membership to Kalspell. He was also an enthusiastic member of the Order of Knights of Pythias, finding in its work an outlet for his energies and recreation from the labors of his profession. In 1932 he served as grand chancellor of the Order of Knights of Pythias, Domain of Montana.

He was a member of the Methodist church, affiliating in 1924.

He passed away very suddenly, at noon, July 29, at his home on Flathead lake.

Surviving him are his wife, Ann, and a son, Edmund, and a daughter, Iva, and a son, Carol, by a former marriage. He also leaves three brothers and three sisters. His father and mother preceded him in death.
