

### HERBERT A. KENDALL

Many relatives and friends gathered at St. Matthew's church Saturday morning to pay their last tributes of love and respect to the memory of Herbert A. Kendall, pioneer Kallispell attorney, who passed away Wednesday, August 20, 1941, at his home in Kallispell.

The funeral cortege gathered at 9:45 at the Kendall home and proceeded to the church, where requiem high mass for Mr. Kendall was celebrated at 10 o'clock by the Rev. F. X. O'Farrell, pastor. Mrs. E. J. Robischon at the organ played the processional and the church choir chanted the responses to the mass. At the offertory Mrs. Florence Herbert sang "Ave-Maria" by Rossini.

The church was nearly filled for the services, with members of the legal profession, Kallispell lodge 725, B.P.O.E., and the Knights of Columbus attending in groups.

Friends serving as casket-bearers were Roman Zeller, J. E. Uehlinger, Ambrose Measure, Dr. J. C. Boyd, E. J. Rawlinson and John Hebert. Committal services were held in the Owen-Elliott cemetery chapel, where the many floral tributes silently expressed the high esteem in which Mr. Kendall was held.

#### Obituary

Herbert Kendall was born September 7, 1878, and came from his home in Michigan about 1900 to teach school in Columbia Falls, which was then an important rival of Kallispell. Two years later he moved to Kallispell and entered the law offices of B. J. McIntire, who was a leading attorney of this section. Mr. Kendall remained with him for several years until he abandoned his practice here and took up ranching and lumber manufacturing on the Flathead reservation.

Mr. Kendall entered into partnership with Senator W. J. Brennan about 1911, with whom he was associated until death summoned the senior partner in 1928. Shortly thereafter he formed an alliance with Charles S. Baldwin and this partnership was in effect until the day of his death.

His public service was frequent and efficient. He was city attorney and clerk 1908 to 1913 and was assistant attorney for a number of terms thereafter.

Kindly and considerate in all his dealings, Mr. Kendall was universally admired and esteemed. He was among the leaders of his profession and his 40 years of efficient service to his numberless clients gained for him their respect and confidence.

He was twice elected state deputy in the Catholic order of Knights of Columbus, was a past exalted ruler of Elks' lodge No. 725 and at the time of his death was one of the three trustees of this lodge. He was also a past president of the local aerie of Eagles.

He is survived by his widow and three daughters, Miss Jeanne, a student at Flathead county high school; Mrs. Margaret Hobe of Alliance, Ohio, and Mrs. Kathleen Forhan of Great Falls. Also two brothers, Jack Kendall, who is at the old home in Emmet, Michigan, and Dan Kendall of Globe, Arizona.

Ray M. Kingsley was born Feb. 5, 1884, at Wescow, Minn. He came west as a young man after completing his high school education at Brycelin, Minn. He worked on construction work in Wyoming and Idaho for several years and then came to Montana and lived in the Madison and Ruby valleys. He became a forest ranger in the Helena district in 1913. He enlisted for service in the World war in April 1917 and served over seas. He was with the army of occupation in Germany and received his honorable discharge in the fall of 1919. He re-entered the forest service and remained until 1933 when a service disability caused him to resign. After living in Boulder for five years he moved to the Flathead and Kalispell. Five years ago he purchased a place on the east shore of Flathead lake where he was making his home.

He was married to Miss Kathleen Webb of Radersburg on May 2, 1925, at Boulder, Montana. He passed away Nov. 25, 1941, at the age of 57 years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Kathleen Kingsley, at home, a sister, Miss Aura Kingsley of Brycelin, Minn., a brother, Frank Kingsley, of Wisconsin and several nephews and nieces.

Mr. Kingsley was a member of the Masonic lodge, Order of Eastern Star, Oddfellows Lodge and a very active member of the American Legion.

Mr. Knott was born at West Cairo, Ohio, May 29, 1862, and died at his home on Columbia avenue February 13. He attended schools at Lima and Crestline, Ohio, before moving with his family to Rochester, Ind., where he completed his formal education. At the age of 18 he located on a ranch near Austin, Texas, and engaged in the cattle industry until 1884. He later lived in Nebraska, resumed cattle industry and acted as chief clerk of the Nebraska legislative assembly.

In 1891 he was united in marriage with Miss Emma Choze and in 1904 they came to Kalispell where he was engaged in real estate and show business until in 1918 when he purchased the Hamiland, McHenry hardware and furniture store in Whitefish, later known as the Knott Mercantile company. His wife died in 1918 and in 1920 he married Daisy B. Gilliland of Kalispell. He was a member

of the Kalispell Masonic lodge and prominent in civic and business circles. Mr. Knott is survived by his widow, one daughter, Laura Knott of Kalispell, one brother, Calvin Knott of Fort Worth, Texas, and other relatives. Burial in the Conrad Memorial cemetery was under the direction of the Catron funeral home.
