Mrs. Linderman's interest centered in her family, her home and her books. She was a great reader and she possessed a keen and retentive mind. Her's was a gentle, kindly, and retiring disposition. To the very end she retained her keen mental faculties and a disposition to be more considerate of others than of herself.

Mrs. Linderman passed away on March 21, 1941, at her home on the west shore of Flathead Lake, after a few months' illness. She was preceded in death by her husband in May of 1938.
