

**DOUBLE DROWNING
ACCIDENT OCCURS
AT LAKE M'GREGOR**

Antone Lambert and L. G. Carlson Both Lose Lives in Mountain Lake—Desperate Rescue Attempt Fails

A double drowning occurred at Lake McGregor about 10 o'clock last evening when Antone L. Lambert, 20, and L. G. Carlson, 17, lost their lives while swimming.

The boys were working at the Burke ranch. (The old Hahn place), and with Tommy Burke, aged 11, got on their horses and rode to the lake for a swim. The older boys were in the water when Carlson was taken with a cramp, and Lambert, went to his assistance, but was unable to rescue him. He called for help, and Tommy Burke rode into the water and tried to throw them a rope. His horse became unmanageable in the water and threw him off, when he returned to shore and

got another horse and rode in again, but the rope was too short and he was unable to reach them. He then returned to the ranch for help.

Paul Casey and Charles E. Lancaster of the Kalispell Fire department went out with the ambulance and pulmotor, and Dr. G. B. Wright of Kalispell was called, but they were unable to resuscitate the boys, who had been in the water between one and two hours before the bodies were recovered.

Carlson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carlson of Marion, and Lambert was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Lambert of Yakl.

The bodies are at the Waggener & Campbell mortuary, but funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

Roger C. Larson is Killed in Plane Crash at Cle Elum

Staff Sergeant Roger C. Larson, age 23, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Larson of Kalispell, was killed while on plane patrol duty near Cle Elum, Washington, Friday afternoon at 3:15, according to a telegram received by the family from Major O. J. Mosman, Corps Commander of the 118th Observation, Coast Guard, last evening.

Roger enlisted in the Coast Guard Air corps three years ago, and his daily work consisted of daily patrol duty. He was instantly killed in a plane crash. Details are lacking as to just how it happened.

The young man was born at Neenan, North Dakota, March 25, 1919. He came to Kalispell with his parents six or seven years ago, and graduated from the Flathead high school in the class of 1939.

Details of funeral services and burial will be made later, pending word from military authorities.

Air Crash Fatal To Roger Larson Described as Spin

The death of Roger C. Larson, which occurred at Cle Elum, Wash., October 2 occurred when his plane went into a tail spin and crashed, according to a letter from Major O. J. Mosman to C. O. Larson.

It was with great regret that I wired you yesterday of the death of your son, Staff Sergeant Larson.

The plane he was piloting had just taken off on a routine flight from the airfield at Cle Elum, Wash. when it went into a tail spin and crashed.

Staff Sergeant Larson was held in high regard by both his officers and fellowmen for his character and ability, and his loss in the service of his country will be deeply felt by all of the 118th Observation Squadron.

was found that his left side was paralyzed, and small hope was given by his attending physician for his recovery.

ONE LOGGER DEAD, ANOTHER HURT, IN SIMILAR MISHAPS

**Leon Landon Killed At Half
Moon And Ole Kingsgaard
Badly Injured At Metcalf
Camp At Marion**

Two similar accidents this morning claimed the life of one man, and critically injured another in Flathead county. Both were struck by logs while unloading them from trucks.

Instantly Killed

Leon Landon, aged 35 years, was instantly killed this morning at about 10 o'clock while unloading logs at the Half Moon lumber mill.

He had taken the binder off the logs and gone around the load to loosen the chain with a hammer, when a large log rolled off striking him on the back of the neck, breaking the neck and crushing his back. His right leg was also broken above the knee.

Undersheriff A. B. Yuill went to the scene of the accident at once and Dr. Kell of Columbia Falls was summoned, but Landon had been dead some time before they arrived.

The deceased was married and had two children and lived at Whitefish. The body was taken there.

The Kalispell city ambulance was summoned, but was not needed.
