**MOTHER OF A. J.
LaCASSE DIES FRIDAY**

Mrs. Alvina LaCasse, 66, mother of A. J. LaCasse of Kalispell, resident of the Missoula district since the turn of the century, widow of one of the discoverers of gold in the Cedar Creek district near Superior, died Friday at Puyallup, Wash., according to word received here. She had gone west to the lower climate because of a recent illness. The family home is at Missoula.

Mr. LaCasse left Kalispell for Missoula last evening to attend the funeral of his mother.

Mrs. LaCasse was born in Quebec, Canada, August 24, 1876. The husband, Alphonse LaCasse, died 23 years ago. Mr. LaCasse and J. T. LaCasse were partners in gold operations in the Cedar Creek district where they made early discoveries in a region which produced millions during the gold rush days. After the death of her husband she carried on the partnership with the husband's brother, J. T. LaCasse, until 18 years ago when they quit mining.

The LaCasse brothers built the Palace hotel block in Missoula.

**"CAP" ELI LAIRD OF
LOWER SWAN COUNTRY
DIES SUDDENLY SAT.**

"Cap" Eli Laird, well known dude rancher and hunting guide, died suddenly at the Laird Lodge on Lindbergh lake Saturday. He was 55 years of age at the time of his death.

"Cap" Laird was one of the most colorful men in Montana, having gone into the wilderness at the head of Swan valley with his wife, Clementine, a number of years ago, where they established one of the finest resorts in western Montana. During the years they have entertained many famous people at their beautiful lodge on the shore of Lindbergh (known to the old timers as Elbow lake).

The deceased was an ardent sportsman, and in that capacity visited Kalispell on several occasions where he spoke at meetings of people interested in hunting and fishing. He was a great story teller, and had the tales of Paul Bunyan always on the tip of his tongue. He and James Urquart of Kalispell, supervisor of the Flathead forest, were old-time friends dating back to the time they were both residents of Idaho.

He always dressed in picturesque western garb and was at home in Chicago or Spokane and at his ease as much as if he was at his home in the woods. He was a hardy soul and in the winter-time usually took his morning bath by rolling in a snow bank in nature's garb, followed by a brisk rub-down. His many friends were shocked to learn of his sudden passing.
