He joined the gold rush to the Black Hills and returned to his work later in California. In 1879 he moved to Butte, Montana, and there he was married November 30, 1883, to Miss Frances Ubkelback who passed away in 1913. The family came to Columbia Falls in 1909 and continued their home there. Mr. Ehrig passed away November 29, 1943, at the age of 95 years.
