Mrs. Hahn is survived by her husband, George and numerous nieces and nephews.

**THOMAS A. HAINES**

Thomas Albert Haines was born Dec. 1, 1889, at Niotaze, Kansas. He attended school and grew up there and at the age of 18 years enlisted for service in the Spanish-American War. He served for three years in the Philippine Islands. Following his discharge he came to Columbia Falls, Montana, in the spring of 1902.
