Obituary

Michael Driscoll, familiarly known as "Mike," was born February 27, 1862, at Lisle, New York, one of nine children of Jeremiah and Ann Ryan Driscoll, both natives of Ireland. Only one sister, Mrs. Mary Sullivan, of Endicott, New York survives.

His early years were spent on his father's farm in the vicinity of Whitney Point, New York. He attended the district school there and the Whitney Point Academy. He remained at home until he was 22 years of age when he went to Minnesota, and in May, 1884, located in Wabasha in that state. He was employed by the Northwestern Lumber Company and Wabasha Lumber Company in that locality.

Attracted by the west, he severed his connections there and came to Great Falls, Montana in August of 1891. He was placed in charge of shipping, retailing and the planing mill of the Butte and Montana Commercial Company's lumber department until he came to the Flathead.

Mr. Driscoll came to Kalispell in January, 1899 and formed a partnership with the late H. G. Miller known as the Kalispell Lumber Company. The partnership existed until 1905, when the firm was incorporated under the same name and is still operating as one of the principal manufacturing businesses in this area. He was also connected with other lumbering and logging operations.

A prominent citizen of Kalispell, in his earlier years, Mr. Driscoll was active in the development of the community. Such enterprises as the building of the Kalispell General Hospital and St. Matthew's Catholic Church, of which he was a communicant, received his cordial support. He was a charter member of the Kalispell Council of the Knights of Columbus and the local Elks lodge and had a wide circle of friends and acquaintances in all walks of life in Kalispell and throughout the state.

For the past few years he had been in failing health but enjoyed the company of many friends who visited him at the family home regularly.

On April 21, 1892, Mr. Driscoll was united in marriage to Catherine McDonald of Wabasha, Minnesota. Immediate survivors are his widow; two daughters, Marie of Salt Lake City, Utah, and Helen of Kalispell; two sons and daughters-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Driscoll of Long Beach, California; and Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Driscoll of Kalispell; and two grandchildren.

BRENDA DRIVER
