Horace Elbridge Field was born April 29, 1865, at Garner, Iowa. He passed away at his home near Creston, Montana, Monday evening, August 20, 1945. At the time of his death he was 80 years of age.

He was married to Martha Jane Benson of Burley, Idaho, May 12, 1926.

His early life was spent in Iowa and Minnesota. In 1908 he came west to Burley, Idaho, and filed on a homestead on the Minidoka reclamation project. He resided in and near Burley until 1925 when he moved to American Falls, Idaho, to become inspector on the American Falls dam then under construction. After the dam was completed he became caretaker in which capacity he served until May, 1935, when he was retired from Civil Service.

Upon his retirement he moved to Creston, Montana, where he engaged in the lumber business with his son, establishing the Creston Lumber Co.

Left to mourn his passing are his wife, Martha Jane Field of Creston, Montana, three foster sons, Frank L. Benson, of Boise, Idaho, John W. Benson, of Creston, Montana, and Fred M. Benson of Missoula, Montana, now with the navy in the South Pacific, and two grandsons, Lynn Benson and Verloy Benson.

The family moved to the Flathead valley in 1896, living first at Demersville and then moving to Kalispell about 1900.

Mr. Force passed away on May 7, 1901.

Mrs. Force became a member of the Methodist church in early youth and remained a loyal and faithful member to the very end. She maintained a remarkable degree of health and mental vigor until within the past year.

Besides her two sons, she is survived by one grandson, Donald, who is serving in the armed forces in the Philippine Islands.
