

WILHELMINA JAHNKE

Wilhelmina Koch was born in Germany on September 6, 1868. In the summer of 1890 she emigrated to the United States and in that same year was united in matrimony to John H. Jahnke. To this union there were born eight children.

They made their home in Chicago, Ill., until 1911 when they moved to Montana where they took up a homestead four miles northwest of Niarada. They spent the remainder of their lives on this farm. Mr. Jahnke passing away August 13, 1943.

Mrs. Jahnke has had a heart affliction for a number of years but it has only been the past three weeks that she was not able to be up and around. She passed away September 3, 1946, at the age of 78 years.

Besides her husband, three children preceded her in death, one at birth, William at the age of 10 months, and a daughter, Mrs. Lillie Whitehead in 1934.

Surviving her are five children, Mrs. Elsie Marquardt of Kalispell, Emil Henry of Niarada, Walter C. of Lisle, Ill., Mrs. Wilhelmina Werth of West Allis, Wis., and Carl E. of Niarada. Newton Ervin Johnson was born Jan. 17, 1874 at Harrisonville, Missouri. At the age of eight years he moved with his parents to Green county, Iowa, where he grew up and engaged in farming.

He came to the Flathead in 1900 and on November 27, 1941, he was united in marriage to Miss Minnie Julia Patterson. They made their home in the Creston district and farmed there until 1916. They then moved to the Stillwater community where Mr. Johnson engaged in logging and farming. They made their home on the Stillwater farm for nearly 30 years and Mr. Johnson passed away there December 31, 1945 at the age of 71 years.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church and a charter member of the Stillwater Grange. He also had served on the Flathead high school board and was connected with the Agricultural Adjustment association almost from its inception and was active in all community advancement.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Minnie J. Johnson, at home; five children: Mabel Grosswiler of Kalispell; Floyd Johnson of Kalispell; Thelma Fransen of Spokane; Vernon Johnson of Kalispell and Wilfred Johnson of Eureka, Mont.; one brother, H. E. Johnson of Sreancon, Iowa, and four sisters: Miss Pearl Johnson of Des Moines, Iowa; Mrs. Mattie Graves of Ames, Iowa; Mrs. Mayme Barut of Sac City, Iowa; and Mrs. Louise Cain of San Antonio, Texas. There are also eight grandchildren. One son, Robert, preceded him in death in 1919.

WALLACE E. JUMPER

Wallace Edwin Jumper was born at Concordia, Kansas, May 31, 1883. He grew up in Kansas and was married at Wichita, in Feb., 1908 to Miss Sarah Ethel Sessler. Three children were born to this union.

The family lived for a time in Canada and later at Havre, Mon., before moving to Coram in 1925. Mrs. Jumper passed away there in May, 1931.

Mr. Jumper was married May 2, 1945, to Mrs. Mollie Korsmeyer at Kalispell and they made their home at Coram. Mr. Jumper had been employed by the Great Northern railway and would have been in line for retirement in about two years.

He died as the result of being hit by an automobile on the highway while returning home from work early Sunday morning, May 5, 1946. He was 62 years of age.

Mr. Jumper is survived by his widow at home, two children, Edwin of Portland and Mary of Dallas, Texas; three step-children, Roland Korsmeyer of Coram, and Robert and Neramae Korsmeyer of Portland, Ore.; two brothers, O.
