**Obituary**

William Samuel McCormack was born in Chicago, Ill., on November 10, 1863 and passed away September 4, 1946 at the age of 82 years.

At an early age he became an apprentice printer and followed this vocation until, at the age of 21, he took a homestead in Nebraska.

He was united in marriage to Minnie Fearing on January 1, 1893 and to this union were born four children—Edith, George, William R. and a son who died in infancy. Mrs. McCormack preceded him in death four years ago.

In 1907 he moved his family to Montana, making his home on a farm in the Lower valley since that time.

Although Mr. McCormack's principal occupation was farming, he had been very active in civic affairs for many years. He was lieutenant governor of Montana from 1924 to 1928, served in the house of representatives and was legislative agent for various farm organizations for five sessions.

He was a director and vice president of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane for 10 years and served as president of the local Farm Loan association for the past 29 years.

He was among the first who pioneered the Hungry Horse dam and made one trip to Washington, D. C. in the interest of this project. He also took an active part in the organization and administration of the Equity cooperative and the Flathead Electric cooperative.

Mr. McCormack was a member of the Methodist church, having united with the church in early youth. He was also a member of the Elks lodge.

Besides his children he leaves three grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, nieces, nephews and scores of friends to mourn his passing.

**CHARLES H. McCULLOUGH**

Charles Henry McCullough was born in Coshocton county, Ohio, on December 24, 1866. He came to the Flathead in 1912 where he has farmed until his retirement.

Mrs. McCullough preceded him in death in 1920. Mr. McCullough died as a result of an accident in the woods on Dec. 19, 1946, at the age of 79 years.

A memorial service for First Lieutenant Jack McWilliams was held in the Community Methodist church of Somers Sunday evening. Special music was rendered by Mrs. Q. Calvin, and a tribute of honor was read by Samuel A. Sather. The memorial address was given by Mrs. R. C. Treloar. Beautiful floral tributes were placed in the sanctuary and a large congregation of friends assembled there.

**Obituary**

Jack Theodore McWilliams was born May 9, 1922, in Bisbee, Arizona; the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. McWilliams.

He finished grammar school in Flagstaff, Arizona, coming to the Flathead in 1936. He attended two years of high school in Somers and graduated from Flathead County High school with the class of 1940.

He became interested in aeronautics and enlisted with the C. P. T. at Kallispell in July, 1942. He was called to report for glider training at Hondo, Texas, the following December, later transferring to cadets. He received his "wings" at Foster Field, Texas, February 8, 1944, and was assigned to a P-47 Thunderbolt fighter plane. During his training period Lt. McWilliams was awarded a war bond for his rating as best all around cadet. His squadron attained a training record of highest in the United States for aerial gunnery.

He was married to Miss Joan Bull of Lakeside May 6, 1944, at Abilene, Texas, and went overseas in July. He was with the Ninth Airforce and served as first lieutenant and flight leader. He fought in Normandy, Southern France and the Rhineland. He received the Air Medal with a Silver Oak Leaf Cluster and the European Theater of Operations ribbon with three Bronze Stars. He was returning from his thirty-sixth mission when his squadron encountered enemy aircraft and Jack's plane was shot down over Hagenau, Germany, January 14, 1945. After being listed as missing

a year, the War department has now declared his death official.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jack McWilliams of Helena, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. V. McWilliams of Somers; his sister, Mrs. Myrtle Hashbarger of Gresham, Wisconsin, and a brother, Gerald, who recently enlisted in the Army Air Corps, and a large number of friends and boyhood pals in Somers and vicinity.

Martha Emmaline Wightman was born Oct. 9, 1855, in Kirtland Ohio. In July, 1862, she with her parents and seven brothers and sisters and other Latter Day Saints left their homes to cross the plains by oxen teams. Their journey ended in October at Salt Lake City. They later moved to Payson, Utah, but Martha attended Brigham Young school in Salt Lake. In October, 1873, she met and married Charles W. Morrill, a young business man and Civil War veteran from Sebecton, Maine. To them were born five children. In 1883 they moved to Butte, Montana.

In 1886 Mr. Morrill, having crossed the Indian reservation by horse, located a homestead near Bigfork. Later the family, traveling by train, stage coach and boat arrived at the ranch on June 17, 1889. There they continued to live for many years. Besides helping make a home in the wilderness she served whenever sickness entered the home and as there were no doctors available she delivered many babies, holding a record of never losing one.

Mr. Morrill passed away in 1902 at the home ranch. Two children, Mrs. Mayme Lebert and Charles J. Morrill, have passed on since, leaving three daughters, Mrs. Wilda Smith, Mrs. Madora Sands and Mrs. Lillian M. Collette, who cared for their mother in her declining years. She is also survived by 11 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren. She passed away May 21, 1946.

Mrs. Morrill had the misfortune to fall and break her hip 3½ years ago and had since been confined to her bed and wheelchair. She loved life and her thoughts never relaxed in her interest for her friends and community activities.
