

Whitefish Man Is Killed By Train

Lyman Edward Imhoff, 60, was killed almost instantly Thursday afternoon when struck by train No. 27 west of Eureka.

According to reports received here, Mr. Imhoff, with two assistants, was running a survey on the Great Northern main line and did not notice the approaching train. His two companions were able to jump clear but Mr. Imhoff was struck. He had been a resident of Whitefish for the past 35 years where he has been employed by the Great Northern engineering department.

Surviving him are his wife, a sister and a brother. Funeral arrangements are incomplete and will be announced later by the Catron funeral home.
