Lee (Tex) Casteel was driving east of Kalispell when he was stopped on the first bridge and informed of the tragedy by a woman who had happened onto the site of the accident and the sheriff was notified and went to the scene with members of his force.

When the sheriff's force arrived, the boy was clinging to a snag in the channel. A rope was fastened around Sheriff Walsh and he swamout to the boy in an attempt to rescue him. As he neared the youth, his feet became tangled in a barbed wire fence under the surface of the water and he was pulled under. Walsh was hauled from the water and a second attempt was made to rescue the hid with the use of a raft. Before he could be reached, he slipped from the log to which he had been clinging and was carried away, by the current, it was stated by Mis. Casteel, who was with her husband.

Walsh was overcome by shock and exposure from the cold water and was brought to the Kallspell hospitist where he is being treated. His condition is reported as not serious.

Although hampered by darkness, the search for the boy continued and at 4:30 Friday morning Art Kemp, Cecil Combs and Neil Seammahorn went to the scene with a boat. Combs (Continued on Back Page)

The mishap occurred when a canoe in which Karstetter and two companions were riding was accidently struck by a power launch. The coronic reported this afternoon that it was established that the victim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clave Karstetter, was not fouled with the propeller of the excursion launch owned and driven by Ed. launch owned and driven by Ed McKenzie, also of Whiterish, but may have been struck by the craft's how. A doctor's report to the coreper gave drowning as the cause of

death.
Altempts at resuscitation through artificial respiration and pulmotor were continued for four hours after recovery of the boy's body, but

failed.
The victim's father is a White-

fish taxidermist.
