Rebecca Mary Davis was born in Sutherland, Iowa, on July 11, 1882, to Walter S. and Anna Cooper. She spent her childhood in Iowa and in 1895 moved to Creston, Mont., with her family. She received her education in the Elliot school in the valley and the high school in Kalispell. In 1916 she moved to the McGinnis Meadow district southeast of Libby and had made her home there since. On June 12, 1900, she was united in marriage to Myron I. Davis at Kalispell. Mr. Davis passed away March 9, 1943.

Mrs. Davis passed away at her home on October 9, 1947, at the age of 65 years, 2 months. Surviving her are six sons, Morris E., Lowell M. and Ernest C., all of Libby, Mont.; Clayton M. of the U. S. navy; Homer T. of Kalispell and Penrod W. of Ronan, Mont., One son, Myron, died in 1906.

GEORGE W. DAY
