#### Obituary

Oscar M. Junkins was born July 1, 1867 at Noble, Illinois. While still a small boy he moved with his parents to Albia, Iowa where he grew up and graduated from the public school. He then went to Des Moines and completed a course in telegraphy and was employed for a number of years by the Chicago and Northwestern railroad. In 1901 he came to Columbia Falls as an operator on the Great Northern. After working as telegrapher for one year he started in business for himself in Columbia Falls, first as operator of a meat market and later in the hardware and furniture business. Mr. Junkins retired in 1930 but continued to make his home in Columbia Falls until his death on August 28, 1947. Mr. Junkins' wife, the former Anna Jones, preceded him in death in 1935 and in 1939 he was united in marriage to Helen McKinley who survives him. He is also survived by one niece, Mrs. Margaret Small.
