George W. Noffsinger was born Dec. 5, 1883, at Halsey, Ore., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Noffsinger, and died December 11, 1947, at the Sacred Heart hospital, Spokane, where he had gone for medical treatment.

The Noffsinger family came to Kalispell in 1891, in the pioneer days before the coming of the Great Northern railroad. George attended local schools and spent one year at the University of Montana. He was first employed by the Railway Express company in Kalispell and afterward in Havre, Butte and Great Falls. In 1906 he was married to Miss Mary Fiedler at Great Falls, and moved to Somers, where he was identified with the Somers Lumber company, and later with the State Bank of Somers. The family made its home in Kalispell after the death of his father in 1924. After 1924 he devoted his time to the management of the W. N. Noffsinger company and the Park Saddle Horse company, and in the interest of the latter company spent much of his time in Glacier National park.

His wife, Mary A. Noffsinger, died at Kalispell in 1934, and he was united in marriage to Mrs. Edwina Van Duzer Carlson in 1936.

Mr. Noffsinger had not been active in the park since the war days, and has been living on the company ranch near Babb. For the past few years he had been in ill health. Those who have had business dealings with Mr. Noffsinger respected him highly for his integrity and honesty. He was a good husband and a devoted father, with a quality of humbleness

his personal contacts, and a sense of humor which delighted his family and friends.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edwina Noffsinger; his son, George W.
