

EDGAR E. TAYLOR

Edgar Ellsworth Taylor was born in Newfane, Vermont, April 26, 1861 and moved with his parents a short time later to West Dummerston, Vermont, where he lived on a farm until a young man.

On February 20, 1884, he was united in marriage to Nellie E. Willard of Brattlesboro, Vermont. In the fall of the same year they moved to Dell Rapids, S. Dak., where they resided during 1908-'09, then moved west to Montana where they have resided since. Mr. Taylor operated a barber shop on West Second street in Kalispell for many years until he lost his eyesight which caused him to retire. He passed away January 5, 1947, at the age of 85 years.

Surviving him are his wife, Nellie E. Taylor of Kalispell; one son, Ray E. Taylor of Whitefish; two daughters, Mrs. Gertrude Halley of Spokane, Wash., and Mrs. Grace Casey of Portland, Ore.; four grandchildren, Norman Rousselle of Kalispell, Mrs. Robert McCarter of Portland, Ore., Mrs. L. P. O'Harra of Los Angeles and Harry Halley, Jr., of Los Angeles. Also two great-grandchildren reside in Kalispell, Mont.

JOSEPH J. TETRAULT

Joseph J. Tetrault was born in Chatham, Ontario, Canada on Dec. 27, 1872, the son of Joseph and Betsamie Tetrault. In 1885 he came to the Flathead valley and had lived here continuously since that time. He was a civil and mining engineer and assisted in laying out the main line of the Great Northern railroad. He was elected to the office of county surveyor in Lincoln county in 1912 and served in that capacity for some time. He homesteaded on Tobacco Plains in 1893.

His home had been at Eureka for some time prior to his death which occurred in Kalispell on June 27, 1947 at the age of 74 years. Besides a host of friends, he leaves to mourn his passing four daughters, Mrs. Roy Reash, Columbiana, Ohio; Mrs. R. W. Heater, Walla Walla, Wash.; Mrs. L. R. Cashatt, Spokane, Wash., and Mrs. Jack D. Fallon, Nevada; one son, William M. Tetrault of Everett, Wash. He is also survived by two brothers, Deward and Dan of Kalispell, and three sisters, Mrs. W. A. Boyd and Mrs. Ed. D. Willis Arbury Tickner was born April 12, 1854 at Perrysburg, N. Y. to David H. Tickner and Jane Currence Minor Tickner. After the completion of his education at an early age, Mr. Tickner was ordained a minister in the Methodist Episcopal church, a vocation which he followed until about 1900. On October 3, 1881 he was united in marriage to Miss Ida Jane Byington at Lynd, Minn. They made their home at Redwood Falls, Minn. until 1883 when they moved to Cedar City, Minn.

In December of 1888 they moved to the new town of Spokane, Wash., from there to Moscow, Idaho and then to Oksdale, Wash. Later they moved to the south making their home in Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky. For a time Mr. Tickner was employed with the Louisville and Nashville railway at Decatur, Ill. They moved to Whitefish, Montana about 37 years ago where Mr. Tickner was employed as a carpenter until ill health forced his retirement.

Of the four children born to Mr. and Mrs. Tickner, two survive: two dying in infancy. Surviving are two daughters, Ethel Jane Sauter of Whitefish and Mrs. Florence Billsborough of Prineville, Oregon.

Mr. Tickner passed away on August 4, 1947 at a local hospital at the age of 93 years.
