JONAS DILLENBECK KILLED IN TRUCK ACCIDENT IN CITY

Jonas Dillenbeck, 44-year-old Kalspell man, was killed about 1:15 this morning when a tank truck in which he was riding with two other men, crashed through a guard rail and rolled over while going down Conrad Hill road at the eastern edge of the city near Woodland Park.

According to Coroner Harry Campbell and city officers, who were called to the scene of the accident, the victim was pinned under one of three dislodged oil tanks and he suffered a broken neck and chest and internal injuries. With the victim

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werg Albert Spencer, reported to have been driving the machine, and Buster Brown.

Spencer and Brown were taken to the Kalspell hospital, Spencer being treated and released. The extent of Brown's injuries are not known and he is still at the hospital for observation.

It was stated by the officials that a nearby resident heard the crash as the truck went through the guard rail, and called the city police. Three tanks containing gasoline and fuel oil were on the truck, the contents being spilled as the truck rolled over. The fire department was called to the accident in case of fire.

Dillenbeck was a contractor and trucker and was born in the Flathead and lived here most of his life. He is survived by four step sons, two of them Fred and Frank Kammerdörfer living here. Other relatives here include Mrs. F. A. Perriek a half sister of Lakeside, and Mrs. Frank Stevens of Kalspell.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete and will be announced later by the Waggener and Campbell Funeral Home.

JONAS DILLENBECK

Inquest Called In Dillenbeck Death

A coroner's inquest into the death of Jonas Dillenbeck has been tentatively scheduled for Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Waggener & Campbell funeral home, according to Coroner Harry H. Campbell. Mr. Dillenbeck met his death last week while riding as a passenger in an oil truck which went over the bank on Conrad hill on east Second street.

Dillenbeck Death Termed Accidental

That Jonas Dillenbeck came to his death due to the overturning of a truck in which he was a passenger, the accident causing him to receive a broken neck and internal injuries and his death being accidental, was the verdict reached by the jury at the coroner's inquest conducted Friday afternoon by Coroner Harry H. Campbell.

Dillenbeck was killed early Thursday morning, May 29, when a gas truck in which he was riding, went through the guard rail and plunged over the bank while going down Conrad hill.

Members of the jury were Howard Hammer, Adrian Adams, E. F. Dickenson, Harry Taylor, A. N. Nelson, and Tom Perry, Jr.

Those who testified were Dr. E. P. Higgins who told of being called to the scene of the accident and the injuries sustained by the victim and Coroner Harry Campbell, who was also called to the accident and told practically the same story as Dr. Higgins.

Police Chief Palmer Christopher, son and Policemen Roy Root and Elvin Christopherson said they were called early Thursday morning and had taken Alvin Spencer, driver of the truck and Buster Brown, another passenger in the truck to the Kalspell hospital.

Buster Brown gave his version of the accident, saying he was dazed by being thrown from the truck and was not sure what had happened. Spencer, driver of the truck did not take the stand.

Harold Hoggett, a mechanic said he had done some work on the truck the day before the accident and Mrs. Mable Kjos, Helen McIntosh and Eleanor Stevens, sisters of Dillenbeck, said they had seen him earlier in the evening and told of his whereabouts at that time.

James Murphy, assistant county attorney, questioned those who testified.

P. J. DITTY, LOCAL RESIDENT FOR 61 YEARS, PASSES ON
