BABY LOSES LIFE AS FLAMES RAZE W. J. MACK HOME

Tragedy struck at mid-afternoon Friday at the rural home of Mr. and Mrs. William Mack near the County airport at LaSalle when an unexplained fire started, taking the life of their infant son and destroying the home.

Dead is seven-months-old William Allen Mack who succumbed from suffocation shortly after being rescued from a burning, smoke-filled bedroom by his grandfather, A. G. Fredenberg. Efforts at resuscitation failed to revive the baby.

According to Coroner Harry H. Campbell, who investigated the child's death, Mrs. Mack, a daughter of A. G. Fredenberg, and her young daughter Sandra, left the baby sleeping in its crib and went next door to visit with relatives. While visiting there neighbors noticed the Mack home burning and rushed over and advised Mrs. Mack and the Fredenbergs.

All efforts by those present to enter the burning building were fruitless as the interior of the new, four-room house was in flames and filled with dense smoke. Mr. Fredenberg then broke out the bedroom window and groped around until locating the crib which he pulled to the window sill. The baby was found in the disarranged bedclothing and brought into the fresh air and numerous efforts to bring the tot to life by artificial respiration failed.

When the fire was first noticed a call was put in to the Kallispell police station and patrolmen notified Sheriff Dick Walsh. Walsh, several firemen and city patrolmen including the victim's uncle, Orville Fredenberg, rushed to the scene. Coroner Harry Campbell and a highway patrolman also went out immediately. All efforts to save the house with portable extinguishers failed. A hose connected to the pumphouse was used to battle the flames until the combine pump and milkhouse

burned down, Mr. Mack was working in Whitefish at the time of the tragedy.

The Mack and Fredenberg houses were only about 15 feet apart and a favorable wind was all that saved the Fredenberg home from being consumed. The houses are located near the northwest corner of the airport. Last year the Fredenbergs lost their large barn and its contents due to fire.

The fire was estimated to have started about 2:15 yesterday afternoon and no reason could be advanced as to how it started as the house was only constructed last year and had a good chimney and wiring. Mrs. Mack stated that only a low fire was burning in the wood heater at the time she stepped next door.

Funeral services for the Mack baby will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Waggoner and Campbell chapel with the Rev. P. B. Hillig officiating. Interment will follow in the Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Body Of Daniel McCarthy Found In Ashley Creek

The body of Dan McCarthy, 72, missing since last Memorial day, was found in Ashley creek near the Seventh street west bridge Monday evening and final rites were conducted this afternoon at the Demersville cemetery for the early-day resident.

Mr. McCarthy had been missing since May 30 and it is believed that he fell into the creek on that date during the flood and was drowned. Sheriff Walsh and Coroner Campbell investigated and could find no signs of foul play. Mr. McCarthy came to the Flathead with his parents in 1883, one of the first families to settle in this vicinity. During the building of the Great Northern railway, he and his brother started the town of McCarthyville, near Essex. He was employed in Kalispell as a painter for a number of years before his retirement. He was 72 years of age at the time of his passing.

He had no family and lived near where the body was found. He was a brother of the late Eugene McCarthy and is survived by two other brothers, Charles, of Kalispell, and John of Arlee. A nephew, Duncan McCarthy, former Flathead county sheriff, also survives.

Last rites for Mr. McCarthy were held this afternoon with friends meeting at the Waggener & Campbell chapel at 2:30 o'clock and proceeding from there to Demersville cemetery where graveside rites were conducted by the Rev. W. Paul Jones of the Assembly of God. Interment was in the McCarthy family lot there.

DRILLER KILLED IN EARLY-MORN ACCIDENT AT DAM

The second fatal accident in less than a week at the Hungry Horse dam project occurred early this morning when a large falling rock struck and killed Harold McClure, 41-year-old Coram resident.

McClure, employed by General-Shea-Harrison contractors as a wagon-drill operator, was drilling with other workmen into the face of a rock wall near the bottom of the canyon when the large piece of rock broke away and fell over, striking McClure and narrowly missing another man who jumped clear.

The details were given, Coroner Harry Campbell by workmen who witnessed the tragedy. They said the

section McClure and his companion were drilling evidently had a seam of soft dirt behind it and was not connected solidly with bedrock and the drilling loosened it and it fell when unbalanced. The accident occurred shortly before 5:30 this morning, a Columbia Falls report stated. The section of rock that pinned the victim was estimated to weigh nearly a ton.

Coroner Campbell, who will make a thorough investigation, said Mr. McClure suffered severe internal chest injuries.

The victim had resided in Columbia Falls and Coram for about 20 years and is survived by his wife and 5 year old daughter in their home in Coram.

The body is at the Waggener & Campbell funeral home and service arrangements will be announced later.

Last Sunday Melvin W. Quade of Kalispell R.F.D. 1-A was killed at the damsite when struck by a falling tree at a nearby clearing project. The deaths of the two men this week are the first on the project since last December.

River Accident Takes Life Of Whitefish Angler

Members of the Flathead Rescue association and the national park service from Belton Sunday morning recovered the body of John McKenna, 60-year-old Whitefish man, who drowned some time Saturday in the middle fork of the Flathead river above Belton.

The body of the veteran Great Northern engineer was found in a deep pool a short distance downstream from where he had forded the middle fork Coroner Campbell said.

According to authorities who investigated, Mr. McKenna had departed from the B & B construction camp on the Great Northern near the river early Saturday morning to fish in Lincoln creek on the park side of the middle fork and when he failed to return to his car at the construction camp late in the afternoon workmen at the camp became alarmed and notified authorities. The camp is about five miles above Belton. Sheriff Walsh, rescue association men and the park service crew started a search immediately and kept at it throughout the night but
