Dolard Tetrault Taken by Death

Dolard Tetrault, age 68, pioneer farmer of the Flathead, passed away early this morning at a local hospital. Mr. Tetrault was born September 29, 1880 in Chatham, Ontario, Can. As a little boy five years of age, he came to Kalispell with his parents and lived here continuously since that time. He had farmed in the LaSalle area until ill health forced his retirement. He is survived by his wife, Minnie, and one daughter, Eva, at the home. He is also survived by one brother, Dan, of Kalispell, and three sisters, Mrs. William Boyd and Mrs. Howard Lewis, both of Kalispell, and Mrs. Joseph Job of Los Angeles. The body is at the Johnson funeral home and time and place of funeral services will be announced at a later date.

BROTHER OF MRS. ALBERT IVERSON KILLED BY TRAIN

Big Timber, July 1—(A)—A freight train killed a man east of here early today.

Sheriff's officers said the body was badly mutilated and papers identified the victim as Richard Thiede, 42. It is not known if he fell from the eastbound Northern Pacific train or had been walking along the rails.

Papers showed Thiede was a member of Kalispell, Mont., post No. 7, American Legion, and was a Northern Pacific railway section worker. It is believed he had been working on a crew near Livingston, Mont.

Mr. Thiede was the brother of Mrs. Albert Iverson of this city. He came to Kalispell last fall and remained here until the middle of December. After leaving Kalispell, he was associated with an oil company in Billings. During his residence here he became a member of Flathead post No. 7 of the American Legion.

Word has been received here that the body of First Lt. Harrell F. Thompson arrived at noon today from the Capasso Distribution center at Ogden, Utah accompanied by military escort. The body was taken to the Waggener & Campbell funeral home from where services have been tentatively scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Harrell F. Thompson was born August 22, 1917 at Great Falls,



Montana and at an early age moved to Missoula with his parents. There he received his education in primary, high school and attended the university for two years.

After attending the University of Illinois for a year he entered the service in June, 1941 and received his training at Camp Roberts, Calif., Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Fort Wood, Mo., and Fort Beckenridge, Kentucky.

He served with the field artillery and was killed in action in Germany on February 28, 1945. Surviving him are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ira E. Thompson at Missoula; a sister, Mrs. E. L. Lopez of Chicago and one brother, M. F. Thompson of Kallispell. Complete service arrangements will be announced later.

Carl Tykeson of the Ferndale district received word that his father, Edward Tykeson, passed away July 23 in Asmundtorp, Sweden where he had arrived the day before.

He left Kalispell July 17 and made the trip to Sweden by plane where he intended to visit his only surviving sister for the first time since leaving there 58 years ago.

He was born in Asmundtorp November 16, 1872 and came to this country in 1890. He lived for a while in Missouri, then moved to two Harbors, Minnesota where he was married to Alice Wilen in 1901. They moved to Portland, Ore., where they lived for a few years, then came to Montana, living in Chester and Lewistown. In 1931 they came to the Ferndale community, near Bigfork, where Mr. Tykeson had made his home since Mrs. Tykeson preceded him in death in 1942.

Surviving are seven children, Harold of Edgeo, Ore.; Mrs. Betty Walker, Mrs. Helen Lowary, Mrs. Grace Blome, and Evelyn Tykeson, all of Los Angeles; Carl of Ferndale, and Russell of Los Altos, California, and seven grandchildren.
