Kalispell Man Dies At Libby Dam Site

LIBBY - Fred Ingraham, 39, an ironworker foreman, was electrocuted Thursday in an accident at the Libby Dam construction site. Ingraham's death is the second to occur at the dam.

The accident occurred when the boom of a mobile crane Ingraham was near swung into a 12,570 volt power line. The crew was working in the main dam left abutment area.

Ingraham lives at 338 Valley Drive in Kalispell. He is survived by his wife and five children. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

The huge project's first fat-

ality occurred early last summer when a large grader rolled off a road and a worker was killed.

Eugene S. Huso, Lewiston, Idaho, was working with Ingraham when the accident occurred. He was struck by the grounding electricity and was unconscious but was revived by personnel working in the area. Ingraham and Huso were employes of Libby Dam Builders, primary contractors on the job, a spokesman for the Army Corps of Engineers, said.

Miraculously escaping injury were Mrs. Josephine Inmee and her two-month-old daughter. They were taken to Holy Family Hospital for check of possible injuries and then released.

Lake County Coroner Bill Phillips says an inquest will be conducted. A coroner's jury has already been empaneled to view the bodies and take preliminary steps leading to the inquest.

Phillips recreated the accident factors. Inmee was southbound on Highway 93. Waiting for him to clear a county road

junction to make a left turn was a northbound cattle truck and a car stopped behind it. The flatbed truck driven by Robert L. Barbe, 23, Missoula, accompanied by Mickey Hanson, 24, came up from the south.

Barbe lost control of his truck with the flatbed loaded with machinery, going into a side skid. The rear end of the truck was across almost all of the southbound traffic lane.

"Inmee simply drove under the truck with the shearing action resulting," Phillips said.

Albert M. Hedgdon, 44, Browning, was killed in a single vehicle accident Tuesday three miles east of Chester on Highway 2. His truck went out of control on a hill, off the road and overturned in a field pinning Hedgdon under the wreckage.

Deaths Ruled Accidental At St. Ignatius

ST. IGNATIUS — Death by accidental, not criminal means, was the determination of a Lake County coroner's inquest Friday night convened at St. Ignatius.

The inquest was conducted on the deaths of Eneas Inmee, 37, Ronan, and his 10-year-old daughter, Betty Jo, who died three miles north of St. Ignatius Aug. 6 following a car-truck collision. The six-man coroner's jury was clear cut in its verdict that Inmee's station wagon top was sheared off when it ran under the bed of a machinery-loaded flatbed truck.

Driver of that vehicle was Robert L. Barbe, 23, Missoula, who went out of control trying to stop his truck for traffic ahead of him. The rear section of the truck swung across the southbound traffic lane seconds before Inmee reached the point of impact.

Charles Lemery was foreman of the jury. The entire inquest proceeding took only 70 minutes.
