## Frank Derry, 64, Dies; Graveside Rites Monday

Graveside services will be conducted at 10 a.m., Monday, for Frank Derry, 64, innovator of the Derrychute utilized primarily by smokejumpers fighting forest fires, in Lone Pine Cemetery in Bigfork.

Mr. Derry died Friday morning in Kalispell General Hospital.

Mr. Derry was born July 27, 1904, the son of Norman and Amy Derry. His interests were many and varied and he was widely known all over western Montana. In this area, he was perhaps best known for his marina at Wood's Bay on the east shore of Flathead Lake.

In 1939, a small group of professional jumpers, with Mr. Derry in charge, conducted a number of dummy tests and approximately 60 live jumps were made, using the latest in parachutes. First actual smoke jumps were made by Derry's close friend, Earl Cooley, presently stationed at the Missoula Aerial Fire Depot. In 1942, the Derry slotted chute, a maneuverable easily opening parachute, was developed. This chute made it possible to convert any standard flattype chute by adding the slots and guidelines. Mr. Derry worked extensively with the Forest Service and was also known as a "barnstorming parachuter."

He celebrated his 64th birthday last Sunday.

Survivors include his widow, Edith, in Bigfork; mother in Wenatchee, Wash.; one son, Frank, of Libby; one daughter, Frances Hubbard, Santa Maria, Calif.; three brothers, Virgil of Aransas, Texas, Norman of Seattle, and Robert of Wenatchee. There are also six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

SEELEY LAKE — Malcolm Dragonfly, 33, Martin City, was electrocuted at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday when he was working at Lake Inez 10 miles north of Seeley Lake.

Dragonfly, employed by Line Construction Co., Kalispell, was working with a power line crew. He was putting away a 12-foot metal tamping pole when the pole came in contact with a 14,000 volt charged transmission line.

Dragonfly was given immediate artificial respiration and a resuscitator was rushed to the scene but he did not respond.

The Missoula County coroner's office investigated the fatality. An inquest is not planned.

He then moved to Roseburg, Ore., and resided there until 1957 when he entered the service serving in the U.S. Army in France and Germany.
