W. C. Janetski Killed In Woods Accident

COLUMBIA FALLS — An autopsy performed this morning developed the cause of death of Walter C. Janetski, 22, Columbia Falls. He was injured about noon Monday at a Royal Logging Co. siding on Hay Creek. The autopsy showed the major cause of death as a massive internal hemorrhage with associated crushing chest injuries.

Janetski died about 1:30 p.m. at the Whitefish Memorial Hospital where he was taken by the Columbia Falls ambulance making a rendezvous with a pickup truck at Canyon Creek. Deputy Coroner David O. Cutler called for the inquest to determine the exact cause of death and injuries.

Janetski and Don Martin were working skidders dragging logs out of the woods to the Hay Creek work siding about 35 miles north of Columbia Falls. Both men were out of the skidder tracks standing on the machines. One slipped sideways and pinned Janetski between the two units.

Funeral services are pending at the Van Leuven Chapel, Columbia Falls. He is survived by his widow, Carolyn, and two daughters, ages 1 and 3 at the family home; his parents and two brothers, Michael and Jack and his grandparents, all of Columbia Falls.

Libby Youth Killed In One-Car Accident

LIBBY — James Johnston, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Johnston, Libby, was killed in a single vehicle accident a quarter mile south of Libby on U.S. Highway 2 Monday. Johnston, home on leave from the service, died of multiple head injuries when he was thrown out of his careening car about 11:45 p.m. The vehicle ended up in the borrow pit upside down and demolished. What caused the ve-

hicle to go out of control is still being investigated by the Montana Highway Patrol and Lincoln County Coroner Hal Gompf. It was the fifth traffic death of the year and the second in four days in Lincoln County.

Gompf commented following the accident that it was just a year ago when Johnston was home on leave from the service. He was a passenger in the car driven by Steve Yarn which went off Montana 37 five miles north of Libby and into the Kootenai River. Yarn was killed in that accident.

Gompf also reported on the autopsy performed on Frank Tallmadge, 45, Troy, killed Friday 13 miles south of Troy on the Bull Lake road in another single vehicle accident. Gompf says there is no doubt Tallmadge died of massive injuries sustained in the accident where his car went off the road and smashed into a large stump then bounced back five feet. There had been some question whether Tallmadge might have suffered a seizure.

Gompf does not plan an inquest into either fatal accident as both victims were alone in the cars at the time of their deaths.
