Andrew Edward Ilgen, 80, three sisters and a number of other relatives who had resided at 916 Seventh Ave. E., died in Kalispell Sunday afternoon.

He was born Aug. 12, 1890, at Hammond, Minn., a son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Ilgen. He had received his education at Owatonna, Minn.

July 22, 1918, he entered the U.S. Army at Minot and had served as a private first class, Co. A, 40th Inf., until receiving his honorable discharge Jan. 18, 1919, at Camp Sherman, Ohio.

Sept. 9, 1921, he was married to Florence Ziebell at Havre and was preceded in death by her in March 1950. In 1924, he moved to Kalispell and was employed by the Kalispell Mercantile. In 1945, he purchased Hollingsworth Electric, which he owned and operated until selling and retiring in 1959.

WHITEFISH — Ernest Izenhower, 69, Whitefish, died Tuesday. He was born Oct. 25, 1901, at Modoc, Ind., a son of Martin and Flora Izenhower. In 1910 he moved with his family to Flaxville, where they homesteaded until 1913 when they moved to a dairy farm west of Whitefish.

He attended Whitefish schools and later returned to Flaxville. In 1924 he moved to Rosebud where he farmed until the late 1930s when he returned to Whitefish and was employed by the Great Northern Railway until his retirement several years ago. He had served in the U.S. Army during World War II.
