Mr. Eayrs was a veteran of World War II. Following his discharge from the services he followed construction work and had made his home in Spokane, Great Falls and Kalispell. He was a member of the Eagles Lodge.

Oct. 16, 1948, he married Mary Christensen in Kalispell and is now survived by her at the family home.
