The following is a portion of the story written for the Holcombs' 65th anniversary.

Open house was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gyron, Kalispell. Mrs. Gyron commented: "I never had the opportunity to know my own father, who died when I was young." She's been a fine friend of the couple.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Holcomb at 85 in 1970 were active. They visited and played whist with their visiting great-grandsons, John and Don Mathison until well past midnight.

Sunday morning the couple was up early with Mrs. Holcomb cooking a family dinner for 17.

Lena Gehrke and Harry Holcomb were married April 2, 1905, at Withee, Wis., and came to Columbia Falls in 1906. They headed up the Flat-

head road, 47 miles from Columbia Falls in 1913. Route then was by way of McGee Hill in newly created Glacier National Park. It was two and three days by horse and wagon.

One of the Hungry Horse News stories about the Holcombs ended up with some changes in Time magazine.

The couple had gone to bed and heard a noise on the closed-in porch. It was dark. Harry opened the door into the porch and saw a black bear eating out of a jar of prunes.

Their shepherd dog, Pudge, went after the bear, and Harry still in the dark, went for his gun, picking up the 12 gauge shotgun in the dark. He called to Lena: "Get some shells, and in the meantime found one. The bear advanced into the living room and Harry got him.

Harry Holcomb's first job in the Flathead was at the old Westburg mill, now location of Stoltze Land and Lumber Co.

At the time the Holcomb homestead just above the river from Glacier National Park, they raised cattle — 30 and 40 head, "but it took a lot of hay during the long winter." There were many deer and the limit, three per person.

In 1926 the Holcombs moved from their log house into their new home, and Lena recalled: "about 100 came for the housewarming in March."

The North Fork still had a number of original settlers, and there were also oil outfits drilling across the Canadian line.

In 1958 the couple retired, and made their home in the Northwest Dam section on the north edge of Kalispell. Their daughter, Mrs. Day lives next door. The Holcombs had a fine garden.

When and if a book on the North Fork is written, the well-known Holcombs rate a chapter. The book should include Harry Holcomb cooking the North Fork fries, and many years serving as judge for the North Fork precinct. As to Harry, he was calm and stable.
