## Accident Kills John Lawlor, 12

Last rites for John Roger Lawlor, 12, Whitefish, were held Saturday with the Rev. John Cronin, St. Charles Catholic Church, officiating. Interment was in Glacier Memorial Gardens under the direction of the Austin Funeral Home.

Johnny died July 12 from injuries received in a bicycle-car collision two miles south of Whitefish. It was reported that the boy and a companion were both northbound on bicycles near the intersection of U.S. 93 and Montana 40 at 1 p.m. when the accident occurred. A car driven by Bradley S. Kruckenberg, Kalispell, also northbound, topped the crest of a rise in road to find the boy in the midst of a left turn and the other bicyclist continuing to travel northward. Montana Highway Patrol reported that Kruckenberg attempted to avoid hitting the youth, but his vehicle struck the Lawlor bicycle and the impact threw the boy to the pavement.

He was born July 23, 1960, in Whitefish and would have entered the eighth grade in the fall. Survivors include his mother, Elaine Lawlor, Whitefish; father, John Lawlor, Columbia Falls; two sisters, Cathy and Becky Sue at the family home south of Whitefish; two brothers, Dick Lawlor, Whitefish; and Larry Lawlor, stationed at Whidbey Island, Wash., with the Navy; and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roger Motichka, Whitefish.
