Julie Britton Qualls, 94, a resident of Polson, died peacefully at home of natural causes on April 18, 2000.

She was born on March 15, 1906, to George F. and Helma H. Britton at Brainerd, Minn. As a child, she moved with her family to a ranch near Phillip, S.D., where her parents homesteaded.

After high school, she graduated from nurses training in Rapid City, S.D. Shortly thereafter she met and soon married John R. "Happy" Qualls in 1929. They moved to Moskee, Wyo., where her husband suffered a severe head injury from a falling tree, necessitating a move to Rushville, Neb., into the family home until he recovered from his injuries.

In the early depression, they and Happy's brother Martin were itinerant cherry and apple pickers in Washington, living in a tent and a Model T Ford. In 1930, they came to the Flathead Valley to pick cherries, got the opportunity to clear land in exchange for land and thus established a cherry orchard of their own. During this time she also cooked in construction camps. In 1935, their fledgling orchard froze out, forcing them to replant. They continued to work at any odd jobs they could find. In the mid-1950s, they sold the orchard and moved to Kent, Wash., where she worked as a registered nurse until 1968. They then returned to Yellow Bay on the east shore of Flathead Lake into the old family home and again farmed cherries until 1979. and their last move to Polson.

She had a tremendous green

thumb, and was known for her ability to graft trees and grow anything. She was innovative and independent, and was planning her vegetable and flower garden for the coming summer. A favorite saying of hers was: "Do everything you can, then just a little bit more." She loved telling stories of her many escapades as a child and of the depression years with Happy.

She enjoyed card games, especially bridge, and delighted in throwing dice, usually collecting all the nickels everyone brought to the game. Senior Citizens of Polson was a favorite place of friendship for her where she spent several days a week finiting and playing bridge. She was always an avid fan of baseball and was able to quote detailed statistics on players and teams.

She was preceded in death by her husband of 62 years in 1991; her parents; her sisters, Francis Kennedy, Margaret Gelino, and Jean Tiensvold; and her brother Arthur Britton.

She is survived by brothers, John L. Britton and wife, Mary, of Ridgecrest, Calif., and Michael P. Britton and wife, Kathryn, of Kalispell; and by numerous nieces and nephews and their many children.
