
Lorene Rose 'Lori' Ulland, 60

She had an active life with family and friends, taking trips and just enjoying life. Swimming at the country club, many lessons in various interests and her friends kept her happy throughout her adolescence. Lori was a majorette in the marching band, played clarinet and was active in the school art club, graduating from Minot High in 1969.

She worked at Grass Printing that summer and entered college at Minot State that fall as an art and special education major. While in college, Lori suffered a broken neck from a fall from the rings in gym class. Her father Dr. Briggs, a physician for the college, was the first one at her side. Lori was paralyzed for a short time "but was healed with prayers to Jesus." From that point on in her life she followed the Lord for the rest of her days on Earth.

Lori started working at the Minot Vocational Workshop and met her future husband Mike who was also working there at the time. Through working together with the developmentally disabled, Mike and Lori became friends.

Mike transferred to the university in Grand Forks and Lori soon followed as they couldn't stand being apart. Lori and Mike were married Jan. 12, 1974, and took turns working and going to school. In September they welcomed their first child, Gretchen, while living in married housing on campus.

school in Boulder. Daughter Paige was born in Helena two weeks after their arrival in Montana. Mike and Lori both worked at Boulder for another year until Mike got a fifth grade position at Kessler School in Helena where they moved into a house owned by some friends from Basin.

In 1985 Mike got a teaching position at Somers School and they moved to a little green farmhouse on Holt Drive in Bigfork. Lori substitute taught, worked at Eagle Bend Greenhouse, Marina Cay and had her own cleaning business. After purchasing a home in Woods Bay, they busied themselves raising their children.

Lori was the consummate mother and brought up her children with good food and a knowledge of Jesus and who he is. There were many activities for the kids and she expanded her family with a handicapped foster child for two years. She began working at Somers School in 1994 as a special education aide and Chapter One aide, eventually becoming a Title One math teacher in Lakeside. Many a Somers child was prayed for at the dinner table during those years. Lori retired a year after her husband, in 2011, somehow getting 22 years of teaching in along with her many other interests.

Everywhere Lori worked she left behind good friends who stayed in touch with her throughout her life, and she witnessed often of her faith to others. Lori could draw and paint, weave and sew, cook and run the home, and be a friend to all — always looking for ways to help others. She was supportive to her children and husband, and honored our parents and other relatives.

Lori will be missed dearly by her husband, children, friends, and four grandchildren. She showed bravery and strength throughout her struggle with cancer, but the suffering here is finally over "and she is rejoicing with Jesus as this is written." Lori graduated with a special education, art and elementary degree in 1975 and was the director of the LISTEN (Love Is Sharing The Exceptional Needs) drop-in center for the developmentally disabled people, a job she loved. "Special" people were always drawn to Lori because of her love and kindness.

Mike took an elementary teaching position in Rolla, N.D., in 1976 and they were there for five years, Lori running a motel that college friends had bought, and living in a house attached to it. Son Ian was added to the family when they were in Rolla.

In 1978 Mike and Lori took their first vacation and visited friends in British Columbia. They fell in love with the mountains, and in 1981 moved to Basin, Mont., where Mike taught fourth through sixth grade, and Lori taught at the state
