BETWEEN CARS

Great Northern Conductor is Crushed Between Two Freight Cars at Essex.

Whitefish, July 11.—Conductor Ben Hundley of Whitefish was in charge of a work train at Essex, Mont., when he was killed last evening by being crushed between two freight cars. Freight No. 401 broke in two at Essex, pulling out a draw, thus necessitating the cars being chained together.

Hundley volunteered to help the train crew on No. 401, and was in between the cars performing this act when, through a misunderstanding of signals, the engine was backed up shoving the cars together, there being no drawbars to keep the cars apart. Hundley was horribly crushed in his left hip. He died one hour after the accident.

As soon as it happened Superintendent W. R. Smith sent a special train and a doctor to his aid but the man was dead before they reached him.

Hundley was a very popular railroad man and highly respected in this city. He leaves a wife and infant child to mourn his death. He was a member of the Masons, Knights of Pythias, Elks and Eagles.

MET DEATH IN FLATHEAD LAKE

While attempting to cross the big arm of Flathead on the ice late last Thursday afternoon Milton Jones was almost instantly killed by going through the ice into the deep waters of the lake. Jones started from the home of his father, a short distance below Somers, to a point below the Big Arm, and when he arrived at the big body of water which he would have to ride around, he chanced the ice being strong enough to hold him up and when nearly half way across the ice, which had been softened by the last few days of thaw and warm winds, gave way beneath him, and horse and rider went into the water. In the struggle in the water Jones was severely bruised about the head on the ice, and though rescued from drowning by a party of Indians who happened to be near, he died within a short time after being taken to land.

The unfortunate young man was well known to many people of the valley, and had lived with his parents near Somers for a number of years. He worked all last summer as engineer on the steamer Wasco, and had accepted a similar position for the coming season with the Flyer. He was a young man of exemplary habits, and had many friends, more especially in the neighborhood where he lived, who were shocked to hear of his tragic death.

He was twenty-nine years of age, unmarried, and leaves a father, mother, two brothers and a sister.

The funeral services were held from the home yesterday afternoon being conducted by the local order of Odd Fellows of which deceased was a member, and a long funeral train accompanied the remains to the Conrad Memorial cemetery, where the remains were laid to rest with the solemn service of the I. O. O. F. order.

Saturday he complained to Mr. Pond that his eyes were bothering him, and as he was working on the night shift, Mr. Pond granted him a layoff of a few days. A. PARKER A VICTIM
Son of Well Known Columbia Falls Lumberman is One of the Unfortunate Crew.

Word was received at the sheriff's office Saturday afternoon that three men had been drowned in the North Fork river a short distance above canyon creek. The men were employed with a Milwaukee crew and in crossing the river on a raft were in some way thrown into the stream, which is very high at this time, and drowned. Andrew Parker, one of the unfortunate men, was a son of H. W. Parker, of the Parker Lumber company at Columbia Falls, and well known at that place. The other two men, C. A. Lacey and W. P. Powell, are men sent in here from outside by the company, and nothing can be learned as to where they came from or who they were.

Geo. Lock, one of the Milwaukee locating engineers, and a boatman were near the men when the accident occurred, but on account of the river being so swift they were unable to lend any assistance, and had to see the men drown within a very short distance of them, but just out of reach.

A searching party was formed at Columbia Falls yesterday morning and went to the scene of the disaster to drag the river and endeavor to recover the bodies of the drowned men. There has been no word received in this city today as to whether or not the bodies were recovered, but it is thought extremely doubtful if anything could be accomplished because of the high swift water.

DROWNED IN BOX CANYON
The report of a probable drowning in the Flathead river last week was brought in the latter part of the week by Lew Shaffer, who had been at Coram spending a few days' outing in the mountains near that place. According to the story James McCarthy, who is well known here, having worked as bartender in a number of places in this city for years, went to the Frederick place near Coram the first of last week for a rest and vacation. He had not been well for some time, and thinking the mountain air and scenery would be beneficial, went to that place on last Sunday. He was not altogether rational, and had been watched by his friends for several days, but on the morning of the supposed accident McCarthy was seemingly better and started out for a walk, saying that he would probably go to Coram and return to town. After leaving the cabin some of his friends became uneasy about him and started out to see if he had gotten safely to Coram. They tracked him in the snow for some distance, the tracks leading to Box Canyon, in the Flathead river. He evidently went down near the water's edge, and then went back on to the bank, again returned to the water. No trace could be found of him after the last tracks leading to the river, and it is believed he walked into the swift water and was drowned.
Lew Shaffer went up to Coram this morning to make further investigation.
